


Welcome to the equality, diversity and inclusion Summer newsletter. Please read on and enjoy this term's news from the EDI Board.

EDI Training

The topic for the Summer term was LGBTQ+ inclusivity (to coincide with Pride Month) and was delivered by EDI Board member and teacher at Vanguard, Dan Bunker. It was a very engaging and informative session and 73% of people fed back that they found the training very useful.

Jamei Moayei, one of the EDI champions at Thames Valley commented as follows:-

"The session was extremely well received by staff, with many commenting on how informative, engaging, and thought-provoking they found the experience. It offered a valuable opportunity for reflection and discussion around inclusion, language, and the lived experiences of LGBTQ+ individuals.

Staff appreciated the practical strategies shared during the training, particularly in relation to creating safe and supportive spaces for students and promoting inclusive classroom environments. Staff also noted how the session deepened their confidence in addressing sensitive issues appropriately and fostering respect across year groups. It was encouraging to see such an engagement throughout the session".


Vanguard



This year for Pride Month Vanguard School got involved in some fundraising. The students selected AKT (Albert Kennedy Trust) as their charity. AKT was founded in 1989. This was at a time when LGBTQ+ people faced persistent and high levels of oppression, physical and verbal abuse, and were denied the basic human rights and equity afforded to others. AKT was created to help LGBTQ+ young people who were at risk of homelessness.

To this day, 24% of young homeless people aged 16-25 identify as being LGBTQ+, emphasising the crucial need for services. With LGBTQ+ hate crimes currently on the rise in the UK, LGBTQ+ young people are at risk of experiencing homophobic and transphobic abuse in their homes. This leaves them with an increased chance of facing homelessness. 50% of the young people AKT supported between 2023-24 had attempted to contact their local authority for support before reaching out to the charity. Many had negative experiences when doing so, often facing long waiting lists and expressing feelings of being devalued and dismissed.

At Vanguard the students have spent Pride Month fundraising. The Year 10 classes have done exceptionally well, with one having a collection jar and the other offering a delicious bake sale for the whole school community. We are extremely proud of our students' efforts to raise much needed funds supporting vulnerable young people. It helps foster an inclusive environment for everyone. So far the students have raised £336 for this amazing cause.





Vanguard



Vanguard held an Arts & Literacy Festival in July which was open to parents and the wider community. This was a vibrant showcase of student creativity, cultural identity an expression across all subjects. Staff were invited to come to school dressed in traditional attire. EDI Board member Diana Edgar hosted an EDI corner and spoke with parents, visitors and students about all the great work being done.

The corner also showcased the incredible presentations that our EDI champions in school have produced across different celebrations.



There was a wealth of interest and cultural representation showcased through art and food, featuring Afro-Caribbean dishes and individuals dressed in their traditional attire. Various hairstyles were explored and history through art.

New Class Names

Students voted on new class names in Lower School. The winning names reflect our diverse society and 3 of the 4 were or are also autistic. Secondary will be voting for their new class names once they have researched inspirational people and then voted.



<u>Wiltshire Class</u> - Stephen Wiltshire MBE, is a British architectural artist. He is known for his ability to draw a landscape from memory after seeing it just once.



<u>Stoltman Class</u> - Tom Stoltman is a British professional strongman. 3 times winner of the World's Strongest Man in 2021, 2022, and 2024.



<u>Windsor Class</u> - Queen Elizabeth II was Queen of the United Kingdom and Commonwealth from February 1952 until her death in September 2022



<u>Turing Class</u> - Alan Turing was a British mathematician who has since been acknowledged as one the most innovative thinkers of the 20th century. Responsible for cracking the Enigma code in WW2 and devising the Turing test for Al- he was at the forefront of early computer science.

What Is Pride Month?

- > LGBTQ+ communities and allies around the world celebrate in a number of different ways.
 - Parades are a prominent feature of Pride Month, as well as street parties, community events, festivals and educational sessions.
 - > Pride Month is also an opportunity to peacefully protest and raise political awareness of current issues facing the LGBTQ+ community.





An ally is someone who stands up for people who are being treated unkindly or unfairly. People might get treated this way for reasons such as their skin color, religion, ability, or gender. Being an ally means providing support and doing your part to make sure things are fair and equal for all. Here are steps that you can take to be an ally!

Who Was At Stonewall?



- Marsha P Johnson was a Black American drag artist who also identified as gay. Atthough she didn't necessarily self-identified as gay. Atthough she largely used female pronouns identify as transgender, she largely used female pronouns (she/her).
- Marsha's legacy lives on today in organisations such as the Marsha P Johnson Institute (MPJI) which 'protects and defends the human rights of Black transgender people.'



- Sylvia Rivera was a Latina-American drag artist who used she/her pronouns. She was a gay and transgender rights activist. She created Street Transvestite Action activist. She created Street Transvestite Action Revolutionaries (STAR) alongside Marsha P Johnson to help house young, homeless LGBTQ+ people.
- The Sylvia Rivera Law Project (SRLP) was founded in 2002, the same year as her death. The organisation works to the same year as her death. The organisation gender guarantee all people are free to self-determine gender identity and expression, without facing harassment, discrimination, or violence. 2

Instead of believing that their story is the same as yours, take time to listen and learn. You can ask to learn more, if they are willing to share, or you can look things up on your own.

Check Your Words and Actions!

Speak Up!

you see unfair behavior or hear unkind words! You may see this in your family, with your r school, or in the community. Even if you aren't the one saying mean things, laughing peaking up means that you are supporting that behavior. If you see someone getting y, say or do something about it. Your voice and actions can make a huge difference!

Get Involved!
